Question	Answer
What is a TMDL?	A Total Maximum Daily Load is a scientific determination of the maximum amount of a given pollutant that a surface water can absorb and still meet the water quality standards that protect human health and aquatic life. Water bodies that do not meet water quality standards are identified as "impaired" for the particular pollutants of concernnutrients, bacteria, mercury, etcand TMDLs must be developed, adopted and implemented for those pollutants to reduce pollutants and clean up the water body. The threshold limits on pollutants in surface watersFlorida's surface water quality standards on which TMDLs are basedare set forth primarily in rule 62-302, Florida Administrative Code, and the associated table of water quality criteria. TMDLs must be developed, adopted, and implemented for those pollutants
	identified to be exceeding water quality standards as to reduce pollutants and clean up the specific water body. TMDLs address specific waterbody segments.
What is a TMDL Document?	The Watershed Assessment Section (WAS) provides monitoring and assessment of waterbodies and a TMDL Document is a synthesis of these activities. This document summarizes the status of a waterbody with respect to a specific impairment. The TMDL Document may contain a single or multiple TMDL Records (based on WBID + Parameter combinations) or multiple WBIDs affected by the same parameter.
What is a TMDL Record?	A TMDL Record is a unique combination of: 1) Impaired WBID that is affected by a, 2) Parameter/ Pollutant, at a 3) certain Allocation (or amount). The TMDL prescribes the limit of how much (the Load Allocation) a particular parameter/ pollutant can be present in a specific Waterbody Segment and the water meet state water quality standards.
What is a WBID?	The Waterbody Segment refers to a specific portion of a waterbody. The Waterbody ID (WBID) is designated by a unique numeric identifier. This provides for more precise scale for monitoring and analysis activities.
How are WBIDs assigned?	WBIDs are assigned to a FDEP district as part of their attribution. There are multiple instances where a WBID may be assigned to an FDEP district, but physically fall within the boundary of a different district. This is because WBIDs are grouped together into basins called Planning Units and there are instances where a Planning Unit basin will fall across FDEP district boundaries. In these cases, for consistency's sake, all the WBIDs that are in the Planning Unit will be assigned to the same FDEP district. For information on which district the WBID physically falls in, please refer to the FDEP Regulatory Districts layer in MapDirect.
Pollutant	A Pollutant is defined as any substance, such as a chemical or waste product, introduced into the environment, that adversely affects the usefulness of a resource.
Parameter Group	The Parameter Group is used as a grouping of Pollutants; these include Bacteria, Biology, Dissolved Oxygen, Mercury in Organisms, Metal, Nutrient, Pesticide, and Radioactive Substances.
Do all water bodies have TMDLs?	No, only waters that are assessed as Verified Impaired have TMDLs.
What does it mean when a water body is	Impaired means that the waterbody does not meet some portion(s) of the water quality criteria established by the Florida Administrative Code, section 62-302.

Basis For Listing	The Basis for Listing is associated with the Assessment Call for a Verified Impaired Waterbody.
Causative Pollutant	The cause of impairment is Causative Pollutant . This specific pollutant is the substance that is given a limit in the TMDL Document.
Load Allocations	The portions of a receiving water's loading capacity that are allocated to one of its existing or future nonpoint sources of pollution. Loads may apply to a specific WBID or they may be distributed among several WBIDs. Whenever the source of an allocation is not attributed to a single source the allocation is said to be an aggregated allocation.
Wasteload Allocations (WLAs)	Pollutant loads allotted to existing and future point sources such as discharges from industry and sewage facilities. Load Allocations (measurable amounts) may originate from Stormwater, Wastewater, or Surface Water sources.
What is a Watershed?	A watershed is the geographic area through which water flows across the land and drains into a common body of water, whether a stream, river, lake, or ocean. Much of the water comes from rainfall and the stormwater runoff. The quality and quantity of stormwater is affected by all the alterations to the landagriculture, roadways, urban development,- and the activities of people within a watershed. Watersheds are usually separated from other watersheds by naturally elevated areas. Water bodies may belong to multiple watersheds.
